The STEM Aboriginal Student Congress is a South Australian department initiative to engage and inspire the next generation of young Aboriginal scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians. Co-facilitated with the YASTSA, the congress connects Aboriginal learners to STEM through a range of interactive and challenging STEM experiences designed to demonstrate that Aboriginal students are powerful STEM learners and lead thinkers.

This application process has been developed to identify students with a passion and aptitude for STEM.

Applications close Friday 12th April 2019.

About the Congress

In 2017, 93 Aboriginal students and 60 teachers and educators participated in the inaugural STEM congress. In 2018 this grew to 220 and 180 respectively. This STEM initiative aims to encourage Aboriginal students to choose STEM subjects in Year 11 and Year 12, thereby providing greater learning but also a broader understanding of future career pathway options. The congress is codesigned and facilitated by the Young STEM Thinkers of SA (YASTSA), STEM teachers, Aboriginal undergraduates, STEM/Industry experts and education leaders.

The YASTSA students and teachers represent the following schools:

This is a **high expectations** conference. Attending students, teachers and guests are expected to actively engage in critical thinking and enquiry based learning. Connections to culture and STEM are integral to the design of the STEM Congress program and much work has been done to facilitate this with our internal and external stakeholders.

Previous STEM investigations have included: Forensic Science, Biomechanics, Water Filtration, Robotics, Dance and Astronomy. These are conducted onsite and off-site at various locations along the North Terrace precinct. This year the program will be expanded to include masterclasses and workshops for teachers and caregivers.

Information for Schools

All students must complete the attached application form.

Students who attended previous STEM congresses will be automatically accepted when they submit their 2019 application.

Each school has been allocated places for two new students. Any nominations beyond two new students will be placed on the waiting list.

All students must complete their own application and demonstrate:

- a positive disposition to learning;
- effective interpersonal, leadership and collaborative skills;
- a willingness to explore and learn how STEM connects to culture and people.

Successful applicants require approval from parents/caregivers and the School Principal to attend the congress including approval to be photographed/filmed during the event for promotion and reporting purposes.

Two TRT days will be provided to each school to cover teacher relief. Financial support for travel and accommodation will be provided after this event.


